

Inclusive Family Document Guide

Adults (18+) — Texas

- Statutory Durable Power of Attorney (Financial) Texas Estates Code §§ 751–752 —
 Authorizes a trusted agent to manage banking, benefits, and property; acknowledged before a notary.
- Medical Power of Attorney Texas Health & Safety Code § 166.164 Names a health-care
 agent if you cannot decide; notary or two witnesses (notary widely accepted).
- Directive to Physicians (Living Will) HSC Ch. 166 States end-of-life preferences; notary or two witnesses; notarized directives are commonly accepted.
- **Supported Decision-Making Agreement Texas Estates Code Ch. 1357** Adult keeps rights; chooses supporters to help understand/communicate; may be executed before a notary.
- Declaration of Guardian for Self (pre-need) Texas Estates Code States
 preferred/disqualified guardians if court finds a guardian necessary; often with self-proving
 affidavit.
- Parent's Declaration to Appoint Guardian for an Adult Child with a Disability Estates
 Code Parent declares preferred guardian for an adult child; include a notarized self-proving affidavit where applicable.

- Appointment of Agent to Control Disposition of Remains HSC § 711.002 Names who will make funeral/cremation decisions; must be signed and acknowledged (notarized).
- Transfer on Death Deed (TODD) Estates Code Ch. 114 Transfers real property at death
 outside probate; must be signed/acknowledged and recorded before death.
- Lady Bird Deed (Enhanced Life Estate Deed) Similar outcome to TODD with more lifetime control; signed, notarized, and recorded.
- Affidavit of Heirship Estates Code Ch. 203 Establishes heirs to real property when no
 probate; sworn before a notary and recorded.
- Small Estate Affidavit Estates Code Ch. 205 Transfers a qualifying small estate without full probate; heirs/witnesses sign/sworn before a notary; filed with court.
- TxDMV POA for Title Work VTR-271 / VTR-271-A Authorizes an agent to sign title/odometer docs when you cannot appear; signatures notarized.
- Deed of Gift / Gift Warranty Deed (Real Property) Transfers real property as a gift; deeds
 must be signed and acknowledged to record.
- Release of Lien (Property or Vehicle) Lenders often require a notarized release so county records or DMV can update the title.
- Revocation of Statutory Durable POA A notarized revocation helps banks/third parties
 accept the change promptly.
