

Inclusive Family Document Guide

Children (Under 18) — Texas

- Authorization Agreement for Nonparent Caregiver (Texas Family Code Ch. 34) Lets a
 relative/trusted adult handle school and health decisions without court; signed and notarized by
 parent and caregiver.
- Form DS-3053 Statement of Consent (Minor Passport) Required when one
 parent/guardian cannot appear at the passport appointment; notarized consent avoids delays.
- Notarized Minor Travel Consent Letter Often requested by airlines/border when a child travels with one parent/another adult; helps avoid denials.
- School Affidavit of Residency (district notarized version) Used when lease/utility isn't in caregiver's name to enroll/keep a student enrolled.
- Parent/Guardian Identity or Age Affidavit (district—notarized) Sworn proof of identity or date of birth when standard records are delayed.
- Caregiver Enrollment Affidavit (district—notarized) Allows a non-parent caregiver to enroll a student based on living arrangement.

- **Caregiver Withdrawal Affidavit (district—notarized)** Allows a non-parent to withdraw a student when the parent cannot appear.
- Affidavit of Guardianship for School Enrollment (district—notarized) Documents who has
 day-to-day responsibility when court orders aren't available yet.
- Grandparent Care Affidavit (district—notarized) Confirms a grandparent/relative provides
 primary care for school decisions.
- VS-142.3 Mail Application for Certified Birth Certificate (Texas DSHS) Mail-in requests require an original notarized signature for services/benefits/passports.
- VS-142 Mail Application for Death Record (Texas DSHS) For certain benefits or family records; mail-in signature must be notarized.
- VS-166 Application to Amend Birth Certificate Based on Parentage (Texas DSHS) Used to add/correct a parent on a birth record; signatures are notarized.
- Declaration of Appointment of Guardian for My Children + Self-Proving Affidavit Names a
 preferred guardian if a parent dies/incapacitated; affidavit notarized with witnesses.
- Consent to Treat a Minor (provider notarized version) Clinics/camps often prefer a notarized consent so a trusted adult can authorize care without delay.
- FERPA Education Records Release (district notarized version where required) Allows schools to share records with outside therapists/advocates for IEP/504 coordination.
